NEW FULLERTON OFFICE WILL OPEN IN TIME FOR VALENTINE'S DAY WEDDING CEREMONIES

Couples love getting married on the sweetest day of the year, Valentine's Day, especially when it falls on a weekend.

To celebrate this year's holiday, Orange County Clerk-Recorder Tom Daly will open the department's newest branch office in historic downtown Fullerton three days before its official grand opening to accommodate couples wanting to tie the knot on Valentine's Day.

Office hours for Saturday, February 14, will be from 8 am to 8 pm to accommodate up to 50 couples wanting to get married. Couples must first obtain a marriage license and make an appointment for the ceremony. Applications are available online at www.ocrecorder.com, and appointments can be scheduled by calling (714) 834-2588.

"This is a special opportunity for couples to celebrate their love and commitment on the most popular wedding day of the year," says Daly. "Staff and I are looking forward this year to host this special occasion in such a festive locale."

In 2008, the Clerk-Recorder Department married 141 couples on Valentine's Day, compared to twenty-eight ceremonies on an average day.

The new North County branch office, at 201 N. Harbor Blvd. (two blocks south of Chapman), provides an easy and convenient location for north county residents. The office will open for regular business on February 17th at 9 am.

The Orange County Clerk-Recorder provides a variety of public services, including recording documents related to real property transactions, maintaining and issuing copies of birth, death and marriage certificates, issuing marriage licenses and performing civil wedding ceremonies. The department also files Fictitious Business Names and Notary Public oaths and bonds, and processes passport applications. The department oversees the Orange County Archives, a center for materials, research and education, preserving Orange County history for the public.
